## **Closing Session and ERG Meeting**

The Annual ERG meeting took place on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> September 2021. It was combined with the closing ceremony, and what would otherwise have been the first ERC lunchtime session on 'Making the most of the ERC and Getting to know EERA' session. The closing session was titled 'Getting to Know EERA, Making the Most of the ECER and ERC Closing Ceremony', and it provided an opportunity for EERA's emerging researchers, their supervisors and research leaders to engage in interactive discussions which supported:

- broadening professional development opportunities and research dissemination experiences internationally;
- exchanging experiences and ideas about research and researcher development;
- actively participating in an European research community for Emerging Researchers.

All ERC participants were invited to this informal session which was jointly facilitated by experienced academics and the ERG co-conveners who enabled those attending to understand the EERA structure and chart their way through the ECER conference program. The session also formed a useful opportunity to connect with fellow emerging researchers.

The following themes were covered during the session in the breakout groups, for informal discussions pertaining with the experienced academics and the ERG co-convenor teams.

**Doing Educational Research:** The session included representation from the Editors of 'Doing Educational Research: Overcoming Challenges in Practice'. This SAGE/EERA book was developed as a result of feedback from PhD students and addresses challenges researchers have encountered in their projects. In this there are accounts of how experienced researchers handled entry into the research field, how they discussed and managed research result that posed problems when accounted back to the field, and how doing research in a second language, i.e. English, creates a complex set of challenges from interpretation to communication of your research.

**Networks, Networking and Development Opportunities:** Discussions around how emerging researchers could connect with experts in their field by identifying their network and attending their programs. Also discussed were opportunities and strategies for building professional networks during ECER and beyond.

**Converting a conference paper into a publication:** Participants were given insights into the unique opportunities available to them after the Emerging Researchers' Conference, to maximise their publication success. Also discussed were the multitude of possibilities that the ERC offers for emerging researchers to receive feedback on their work, for example during and after their conference presentationss.

**ERG co-convenors:** Meet the Emerging Researchers' Group co-conveners who shared their recent experiences as Early Career Researchers and provided helpful tips for making the most of the conference experience.

The ERG meeting part of the meeting covered the annual activities of the ERG and projects for the future. As is now practice during the ERG meeting, following the introduction about the goals and activities of the ERG, all the participants broke up into small breakout groups in Zoom. Each subgroup was facilitated by either one or two members of the ERG team, EERA Council, EERA Exec, EERA Networks, ERG senior mentor and senior fellows who facilitated discussion about participants' suggestions for specific areas of development and further initiatives that can meet participants' needs. A collaborative <u>Padlet activity</u> was undertaken during the breakout activity. - Publishing in English (#1)

### What development activities would you like to see in the ERG programme, eg:

#### academic writing workshop, etc.

- Networking activities between emerging and senior researchers (#4)
- Activities for the transition into the ECER conference (from ERC), particularly how to join a network **(#1)**
- Mixed Methods workshops (e.g. mixed methods research, Interpretive Phenomenological Analysis, how to analyse data and particularly, how to start) **(#1)**
- Networking skills (there can be group networking regarding interesting areas) (#1)
- Beneficial to hear about the editing process. Repeat workshops would be beneficial. (#1)
- Learn more about open access journals and some of the options that might be worthwhile (#2)
